## **IAC Recycles!**

It's habit to throw our refuse into the trash when we have used up a consumable, but did you know that the new Compact Fluorescent Light Bulbs (CFLs) are hazardous to the environment? CFLs contain mercury and may break when thrown into a dumpster, trash can or compactor, or when they end up in a landfill or incinerator. The release of mercury contributes to polluting our ground water.

IAC has recently implemented a program to add Hazardous Waste disposal to our recycling efforts. We already recycle plastic, paper and cans, so adding CFLs was an easy decision. Since CFLs are considered hazardous, we are encouraging employees to bring their burned-out bulbs into work where they will be collected and taken to an appropriate facility for recycling. All batteries (rechargeable or not) are also considered hazardous waste and we are collecting those from employees as well.
